



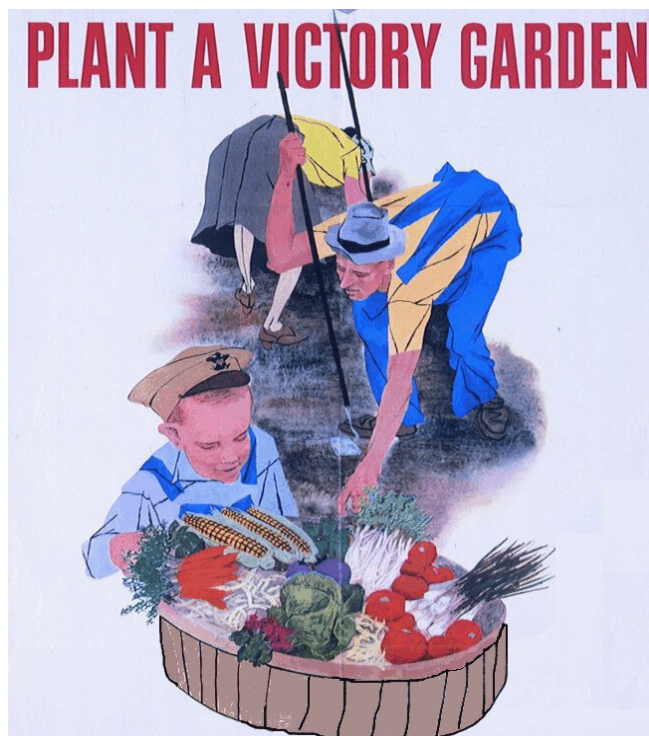



Growing Basics -
