The American Woodcock is a bird which is considered a species in greatest need of conservation in the New Hampshire Wildlife Action Plan. The "singing fields" and brushy habitat that woodcock need also benefit many other wildlife species.



At this workshop information will be presented to help landowners with young forest and field management, as well as a discussion on what assistance is available. We will also visit the Huntington Hill Wildlife Management Area, which has been managed for woodcock and grouse for over 25 years. The event will conclude with a walk at twilight where participants can visit local singing grounds to witness the aerial courtship display of this amazing little migratory bird!

From the South: Take I-89 to Exit 18. Turn right (north) on NH Rt. 120. Go 0.5 miles to the second light, right on Etna Rd. Travel 1.5 miles to intersection, go right on Hanover Center Rd., travel 4 miles to grey cape and barn on the left.

From the North: Take NH Rt. 10. 4.5 miles south of Lyme, left on Goodfellow Rd., go right on Hanover Center Road, travel 1/4 mile south to grey cape and barn on the right. Alternate from Route 10: Goose Pond Road to Rennie Road to Hanover Center Road, 0.25 miles south of Goodfellow Road intersection.
