

Teaching Hillsborough County Residents to Manage

Do you know that UNH Cooperative Extension has LOTS of programs and resources to help you learn to manage your money and family resources better? Do you know that Educator Sharon Cowen travels throughout the county to spread the word that managing money isn't as hard as you think? Do you know that many resources are on the UNHCE website for FREE?

Family and Consumer Resources Educator Sharon Cowen will tell you that she loves her job. She'll also tell you it's the people she teaches that make the job great. She's proud that over 1000 Hillsborough County residents have attended her financial management classes, and based on class evaluations, almost all have learned information that will help them in the future. "I'm a one-woman money management road show in Hillsborough County," Cowen laughs. "I go wherever people want me to go in the county. Organizations and towns invite me to do a class, and then find space where I can set up shop. I've been in churches in New Ipswich and Peterborough, the police station in Hillsborough, the libraries in Hudson and Nashua, Valley Street Jail, the YWCA in Manchester, and the family resource center in Antrim, just to name a few. I've even done brown bag lunch workshops for employers." All that just makes her want to teach more.

"At the end of the day," Cowen says, "I want people to know they can do this. They can manage their own resources to meet goals. Sometimes people don't have enough money, so we talk about what they can do differently, how they can stretch what they have. One of my favorite groups to teach is young adults, especially when they realize they need to learn to manage their resources more effectively. I recently did a workshop for young AmeriCorps volunteers. They don't get paid much, and they struggle to pay their living expenses. They were so appreciative and receptive to what I had to say. It was incredibly rewarding."

Statewide, UNH Cooperative Extension provides research-based family resource management educational programs and resources that are designed to increase knowledge and skills and change the way people spend (and hopefully), save money. And, if you help households learn to become more financially stable, you help communities.

Tractor Rollover Protection Systems Program (ROPS) Launched in New Hampshire

On November 30, 2010, three simultaneous events were held around New Hampshire to launch the New Hampshire Tractor Roll Over Protection Systems (ROPS) Program. This has been established to offer a rebate program to farmers for installing rollover protection on their tractors. The number one cause of farming fatalities is tractor rollover, and a ROPS system and seat belt are 99% effective in preventing these deaths. The purpose of these events was to make farmers aware of the benefits of rollover protection and introduce a new cost-share program in the state to help defray the expense of installing the steel roll bar unit, which provides a space of safety for the operator in the case of a tractor overturn.

The John Deere companies of New Hampshire accepted the challenge to host the launch event. Area representatives, Anthony Souhrada and Raymond Nunez, helped put together a meeting and refreshments at Blackmount Equipment in North Haverhill, R.N. Johnson in Walpole, and James Rosencrantz and Sons in Kensington. The sessions were organized in partnership with the New Hampshire Department of Agriculture, Markets & Foods; New York Center for Agricultural Medicine and Health (NYCAMH); UNH Cooperative Extension; and the New Hampshire Farm and Rural Education Foundation, and New Hampshire Farm Bureau.

About 25 people were present at each site, representing farmers, program supporters and the media. Several newspapers were present, plus WMUR television at the Kensington site, and many more newspapers and radio stations reported on the ROPS program and the roll-out event. Presentations consisted of an overview of the importance of rollover protection, introduction of the dealership and display of tractors with ROPS installations, explanation of how the rollover protection rebate program works, farmer testimonials about farm safety and an opportunity to sign up for the New Hampshire program.

A typical ROPS installation can cost \$700 - \$1,500 and the New Hampshire ROPS Rebate Program will reimburse farmers 70 percent of the cost of a tractor rollover protection kit - a roll bar and seatbelt - up to \$765. New Hampshire will have the benefit of using the resources of the NYCAMH ROPS hotline which provides assistance identifying and pricing the appropriate rollover kits for tractors.

The New Hampshire ROPS Rebate Program is entirely funded by donations and to date has been supported by: John Deere, the NH Department of Agriculture Markets & Food, Co-Operative Insurance Companies, Farm Family Life and Casualty Insurance Companies, Blackmount Equipment, RN Johnson, James Rosencrantz & Sons, Farm Credit East, Yankee Farm Credit, Farm Service Agency, Chappell Tractor and Townline Equipment.

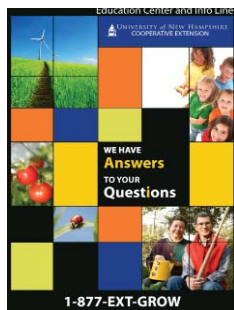

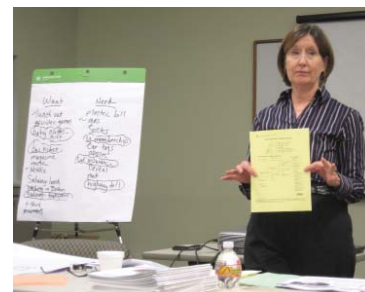
To that end, UNHCE has a "toolbox" of resources to help Hillsborough County and New Hampshire residents increase savings, decrease debt, and build their ability and confidence to make better financial decisions.

Unfortunately, the current economy has added to the need for financial education in the county and state. UNHCE has increased its educational resources to respond to specific issues caused by the poor economy. In addition, statewide, UNHCE has identified "increasing rates of financial instability among families, individuals, and seniors" as a significant issue to be addressed in educational efforts.

"I have seen an increase in the requests to do family resource management workshops and programs in the county, and from places in the county which have never asked before. It's a tough time for many Hillsborough County households," Cowen says. "We are fortunate in NH to have so many resources to offer county residents. And, based on the needs of local audiences, I also develop additional programs or add to the ones provided by statewide staff in Durham. "

Statewide Family Resource Management Program Specialist Suzann Knight announced her retirement to educators at a meeting on December 1. Cowen had these comments, "Suzann has provided so many educational resources and programs to the citizens of New Hampshire. We all wish her well, but it will be a loss. She has contributed many years and much knowledge, talent and hard work. We will miss her."

Family Resource Centers Support Hillsborough County Families

Family Resource Centers in New Hampshire provide families with resources, educational programs, and support services. In Hillsborough County there are four centers serving families and communities in unique ways that best meet the needs of residents in those areas of the county. During this time of economic difficulties for many people, family resource centers may offer programs to help, or they may be able to suggest other community programs and resources. Even if you are not facing financial issues, family resource centers are good to know about, just in case you or someone you know needs them.

The Grapevine, in Antrim, provides a variety of parenting education programs, a preschool, a playgroup, access and referral to community resources and services, and other community programs and activities. For information they can be contacted through the town of Antrim website (www.antrimnh.org) and by calling 603-588-2620.

The River Center in Peterborough serves fourteen towns in the Monadnock Region: Antrim, Bennington, Dublin, Francestown, Greenfield, Greenville, Hancock, Jaffrey, Mason, New Ipswich, Peterborough, Rindge, Sharon, and Temple with parenting education, financial management education, and other supports and resources necessary to the quality of life for people of all ages and abilities. The Family Education Collaborative in Manchester is housed at the YWCA and is a collaboration of YWCA, UNH Cooperative Extension, UNH Manchester, and Child and Family Services. Finally the fair arrived. What a thrill! Then show day came. only I didn't know it was show day. Being so new at 4-H, I didn't realize that there was a 4-H and Open show.

The class call went out. The only thing Old Shirley and I could do was enter the ring as we were. The judge gave me a hard time about my doe not being groomed, and that I was so unprepared with no show clothes. I was devastated. I had worked so hard. After I had quickly recovered, my disappointment turned to determination. I scrubbed, brushed and polished Shirley until she was cleaner than me. I came back to the open show two days later and went on to beat the Junior and Senior classes. I won Fitting and Showmanship Champion as a novice! Words can't express the extreme satisfaction and joy I felt. I can tell you however, that I was hooked that day. That same determination, hard work and excitement has brought me through many shows.

At our county fair this year I had the great pleasure of watching a younger 4-H'er, who had leased a doe from me, show for the first time. I helped her train and prepare all year for the fair. As the Judge gave her the blue ribbon I saw that same joy in her eyes that I had found in myself at my very first show. That day she also caught the 4-H fever.

As a young member, I looked up to the older girls. They were and are still such role models for me. Now as a senior member it amazes me that I can be that role model for someone else. I hope that my 4-H memories will continue to encourage others to start their own.
