## ***NH Coverts Project Program Accomplishments 2007***

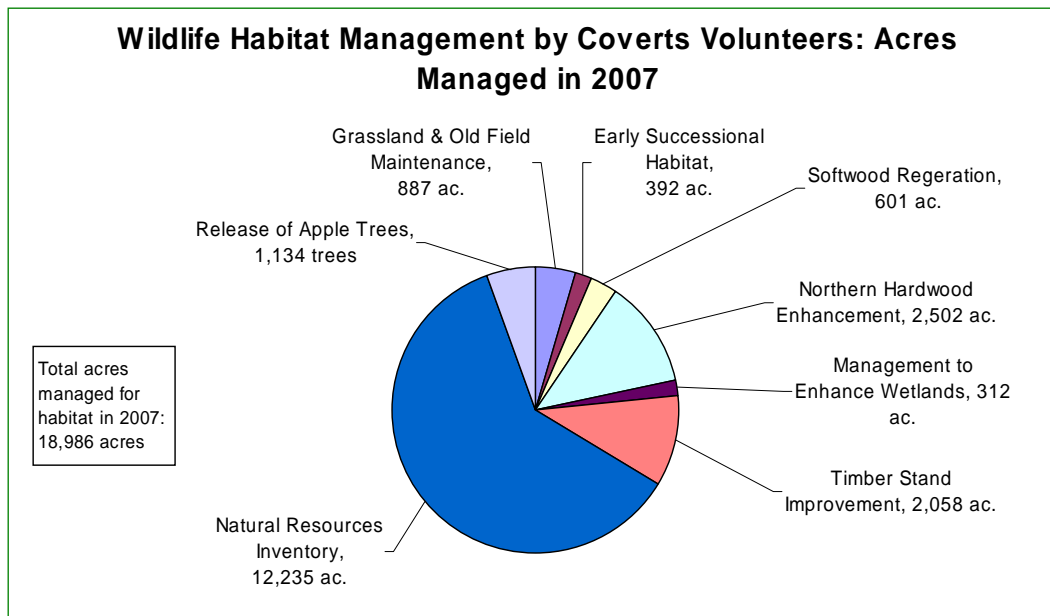
- Organized the 13th annual Coverts Training Workshop and trained 23 new Coverts Cooperators from 19 different communities.
- Organized or co-sponsored 10 continuing education programs designed for Coverts alumni.
- Promoted participation by Coverts Cooperators in over 65 natural resource-focused educational workshops.
- Worked with new partners to encourage new volunteer opportunities for Coverts Cooperators including those with Project Learning Tree, NH Audubon, NH State Parks, and NH Fish & Game.
- Instigated bi-weekly email update, consolidating announcements of workshop and volunteer opportunities (continued to mail to 20 volunteers w/o email).
- Continued to manage email discussion forum (“listserv”) for 189 participating Coverts Cooperators and natural resource professionals.
- Added many new features to Coverts webpage: **NHCoverts.org**, including adding Coverts reference notebook (provided at the annual workshop) to the website, with links to over 80% of the material.
- Published two editions of *Making Tracks* newsletter, with submissions by over 50 volunteers.
- Showcased traveling Coverts exhibit at five venues in 2007, using both staff and volunteer exhibitors.
- Helped form new group, “Natural Resource Volunteer Network” to enhance collaboration among other natural resource programs on volunteer training and service opportunities.
- Published article (in press) in “Northern Woodlands” focused on stewardship by a Coverts volunteer.
- Accessed network of Coverts landowners to promote the Northern Forest Woodcock Initiative to New Hampshire landowners. Funding was available for landowners to do habitat management that benefits woodcock. Over 90% of landowner interest in the program was from Coverts Cooperators.
- Working with Coverts volunteer, coordinated new neighborhood land management effort (3,000 acres with 20+ landowners) to experiment with ecosystem management to benefit wildlife (“Northwood Area Land Management Collaborative”).
- Attracted new financial support for NH Coverts from Quality Deer Management Association.
- Attended annual conference of “Alliance of Natural Resource Outreach & Service Programs,” an organization that brings together different kinds of programs that train adults to do outreach in natural resources fields (e.g. Master Naturalists, Watershed Stewards, etc.).

## ***NH Coverts Project – Looking Ahead to 2008***

- Addition to Coverts webpage of email updates (blog format) for easy access by Coverts volunteers
- Meeting of Coverts Advisory Committee (Feb. 2008).
- New continuing education workshops on stewardship of critical habitats, including: Grasslands, Vernal Pools, Marsh & Shrub Wetlands, and Floodplain Forests.
- Train new class of 25 volunteers at 2008 Coverts Workshop scheduled for Sept. 3-6 in Hancock, NH.
- Improve access to volunteer opportunities for Coverts through Natural Resource Volunteer Network.

## Coverts Volunteer Service - 2007

- **240 active volunteers** are currently working in 120 different NH communities
- Coverts volunteers own or manage over 46,000 acres
- Almost 50% of Coverts volunteers serve on their town's Conservation Commission
- Coverts volunteers manage thousands of acres of land specifically for wildlife each year:



## Coverts Volunteer Service Since 1999 - Cumulative Statistics -

- Since 1999, Coverts volunteers have contributed over **47,000 hours of service** on behalf of wildlife and stewardship to the State of New Hampshire. This service has an estimated **value of \$1 million** (rate adjusted by year; 2006 rate is \$18.77/hour according to [www.independentsector.org](http://www.independentsector.org)).
- Since 1999, volunteers have managed thousands of acres of land specifically for wildlife habitat:
  - **7,219 acres of grasslands** & old fields have been kept open
  - **7,245 acres of early successional habitat** have been created or maintained
  - **6,503 acres managed to enhance softwood habitats** for snowshoe hare, deer, etc.
- Since 1999, Coverts volunteers have reached over **190,000 people** through their outreach efforts, eg: distributing handouts, hosting programs, talking to neighbors, staffing exhibits, writing news articles.
- Since 1999, Coverts volunteers have helped permanently conserve over **180,000 acres** of land in NH.

## New Ideas for the Coverts Program
