Uneven-aged management – it can be tough to understand, and even tougher to implement in the field. Which trees should we keep, and which trees should we cut in each size class? What scale should we be looking at? How can we best achieve our objectives while preserving the fragile understory and the age class distribution when we re-enter the stand? We use the terminology, but are we really implementing uneven-aged management systems on the ground?
