## **Habitat Management**

"I've spent the last 4 months developing a forest management plan for our 34 acres [in Eaton]. Together with the knowledge I gained at the [NH Coverts Project workshop] as well as help from a variety of foresters, we have set up a plan to stagger our forestry and begin encouraging different-aged patches. Additionally, I've been able to help shed light on neighbors' properties as they try to make decisions about cutting/clearing and managing sections of their own forests." - Coverts Volunteer, 2017

## **Supporting Conservation**

"As a member of the Conservation Commission, I was able to participate in the completion of a three year land acquisition project which permanently conserves 580 acres [...] and connects the land to a larger body of conserved land. - To increase the amount of New Hampshire's public and private land managed with a stewardship ethic.





# 2017 **VOLUNTEER SERVICE**

In 2017, Coverts Cooperators contributed 21,915 volunteer hours on behalf of forest stewardship or wildlife habitat issues in their communities, valued at over \$545,000. Coverts Cooperators worked to conserve over 4.794 acres of land in their communities, and reached out to over 12.300 **people** with a message of sound forest stewardship and wildlife conservation in 2017.

## **SPEAKING FOR WILDLIFE**

The *Speaking for Wildlife* program involved over 190 Coverts Cooperators and other trained volunteers in conducting wildlifethemed presentations and leading field walks on conservation lands statewide. 2017 impacts from this group of volunteers include:

- Volunteers delivered **31** public talks reaching **638** people
- Volunteers led 20 field walks, with over 180 participants

Since the development of the program in 2010, Speaking for Wildlife volunteers have delivered over 270 presentations and 115 field walks reaching over 7,500 people throughout New Hampshire.

## LAND MANAGEMENT

Coverts volunteers currently own or manage over 150,000 acres in New Hampshire and manage thousands of acres for wildlife each year:

# The acres add up.

Since 1999, Coverts volunteers have managed thousands of acres of land specifically for wildlife habitat:

11,009

acres of early successional habitat have been created or maintained

15,611

acres of grasslands & old fields have been kept open

9,136

acres managed to enhance softwood habitats for a variety of wildlife active Coverts volunteers are currently working in 175+ New Hampshire communities



## **CUMULATIVE IMPACTS** 1999-2017

Since 1999 (the first year data is available), Coverts volunteers have contributed over 310,000 hours of service on behalf of wildlife and stewardship to the state of New Hampshire. This has an estimated value of over \$6.6 million. Coverts Cooperators have reached over **465,000 people** through outreach efforts, and worked to permanently conserve 308,000 acres of land.

# PROGRAM ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Organized the 23<sup>rd</sup> annual Coverts Training Workshop in Greenfield, NH. Trained 24 new Coverts Cooperators from 21 different New Hampshire communities.
- Sent 22 e-mail newsletter updates that included volunteer opportunities, workshops and trainings, and 20 different news items posted to the Coverts Blog (extension.unh.edu/Article Categories/Coverts).
- Expanded the Speaking for Wildlife volunteer speakers bureau program, training 43 volunteers. In total, 51 talks and walks held statewide reached over 800 people. A new talk – Reptiles & Amphibians: Warming Up to New Hampshire's Cold-blooded *Natives* – was developed and made available to volunteers.
- Hosted several continuing education opportunities designed for Coverts volunteers, including a wildlife tracking workshop and nature journaling workshop.
- Promoted Coverts participation in hundreds of trainings and volunteer opportunities statewide, including through *The Stewardship Network:New* England.







# **LOOKING AHEAD** to 2018

- Continue to encourage and train Coverts volunteers to participate in the Speaking for Wildlife program, giving more talks and leading more walks on conservation land in New Hampshire.
- Train up to 25 new volunteers at the 2018 Coverts Workshop, scheduled for May 2-5 in Greenfield, NH.
- Continue to improve volunteer and continuing education opportunities for Coverts volunteers, including through *The* Stewardship Network: New England.
