Volunteer Service - 2013

- **350 active Coverts volunteers** are currently working in 160+ different NH communities.
- In 2013, Coverts Cooperators contributed **20,936 volunteer hours** on behalf of forest stewardship or wildlife habitat issues in their communities, **valued at over \$450,000**.
- Coverts volunteers currently own or manage over 125,000 acres in NH.
- Coverts Cooperators **worked to conserve over 13,000 acres** in New Hampshire in 2013.
- Coverts volunteers **reached out to over 17,000 people** with a message of sound forest stewardship and wildlife conservation.
- Coverts volunteers manage thousands of acres of land specifically for wildlife each year:

- The *Speaking for Wildlife* program involved over 140 Coverts Project volunteers (and other interested volunteers) in conducting wildlife-themed presentations and leading nature walks on conservation lands statewide. 2013 impacts from this group of volunteer include:
 - o Volunteers delivered 42 public talks reaching 747 people in their audiences
 - Volunteers led 23 field walks, with over 262 participants

Coverts Volunteer Service Since 1999 - Cumulative Impacts -

- Since 1999 (the first year data is available), Coverts volunteers have contributed over **216,540 hours of service** on behalf of wildlife and stewardship to the State of New Hampshire. This service has an estimated **value of \$4.4 million** (rate adjusted by year, using www.independentsector.org).
- Since 1999, volunteers have managed thousands of acres of land specifically for wildlife habitat:
 - 12,304 acres of grasslands & old fields have been kept open
 - 9,447 acres of early successional habitat have been created or maintained
 - 8,051 acres managed to enhance softwood habitats for snowshoe hare, deer, etc.
- Since 1999, Coverts volunteers have reached over **400,816 people** through outreach efforts
- Since 1999, Coverts volunteers have worked to permanently conserve over **280,857 acres** of land.

Program Accomplishments 2013

Program Accomplishments 2013

- Organized the 19th annual Coverts Training Workshop in Greenfield, NH. Trained 21 new Coverts Cooperators from 16 different communities.
- Posted over 52 different updates to the Coverts Blog, also emailing volunteers with new information. Blog:

- Promoted Coverts participation in hundreds of volunteer opportunities statewide.
- Expanded the "Speaking for Wildlife" volunteer speakers bureau program. Trained 10 new volunteers who delivered over 42 talks and led 23 field trips statewide, reaching over 1,000 people.
- Created new Facebook Group for NH Coverts volunteers
- Involved Coverts volunteers in stakeholder meetings for the Stewardship Network: New England initiative.



Looking Ahead to 2014



- Continue to encourage and train Coverts volunteers to participate in the *Speaking for Wildlife* program, giving more talks and leading more walks
- Train 25 new volunteers at 2014 Coverts Workshop, scheduled for May 7-10 in Greenfield, NH.
- Convene Coverts Advisory Committee in Fall 2014
- Work to improve volunteer opportunities for Coverts volunteers through *The Stewardship* Network: New England initiative.
