The Nature Conservancy and partners recently completed a computer-based modeling approach to identify wildlife corridors in northern New Hampshire, which is part of the Staying Connected Initiative, a multi-state and bi-national partnership aiming to maintain and restore landscape connections across the Northern Appalachian/Acadian Forest. In the past year we developed a number of site specific strategies to safeguard wildlife connectivity, which are the focus of the workshop. These include road barrier mitigation, restoration, and land protection.
