GENERAL 4-H RULES

The 4-H Building premiums listed are being offered to 4-H clubs and 4-H members enrolled in Rockingham County for the year 2016-2017. Cloverbuds can enter projects completed under Section IV. Clubs entering exhibits and 4-H members doing educational displays must register for space with the **4-H office by September 1**, **2017**, in order to get exhibit numbers from the Deerfield Fair Association.

Exhibits must be in place and set up on DEERFIELD FAIRGROUNDS no later than 8:00 pm, Tuesday, September 26, 2017. Set-up times are Monday, September 25, from 3:00 to 8:00 pm, and Tuesday, September 26, from 9:30 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. Overall 4-H club exhibits will be judged on Wednesday, September 27. Exhibits must remain in place until 7:00 pm, Sunday, October 1, 2017. (See General Rule no. 3) Exhibits may be picked up Sunday, October 1, 2017, from 7:00 to 8:00 p.m., or on Monday, October 2, 2017, from 10:00 to 11:30 a.m. Clubs entering the fair are responsible for set-up, take-down, and for completing club exhibit sheets. Club exhibit sheets must be returned to the 4-H office with signatures of the 4-Hers after they have received their payments for premiums earned.

Products and articles must represent work completed by 4-H members as a 4-H project since last year's Deerfield Fair. Products or articles not making a satisfactory exhibit, improperly labeled, not following instructions for entry, or not having minimum numbers specified for exhibit may be disqualified or receive a ribbon only. 4-H exhibit tags and canning labels are available at the UNH Rockingham County Extension Office. Exhibits that spoil will be removed .Duplicate entries in any class will not be allowed. It is ok to exhibit many items in a given division and class as long as they are different techniques. Items with similar skills/techniques will be grouped as a set with one ribbon and one premium awarded for the group. Projects done for a school grade or requirement such as shop, family consumer science, or life skills class or any other organization such as Boy Scouts or Girl Scouts cannot be exhibited. Exhibits are shown at members' own risk. Decisions of judges and 4-H superintendents are final

Garments entered in both 4-H Club Department and sheep lead line class must get prior permission from the 4-H Extension educator before removing for lead line class. Garments must be returned to the 4-H building one hour after lead line class ends or premiums will be withheld.

Premiums and the permission to exhibit in future years may be withheld from anyone not complying with any rule or regulation in any 4-H class; or whose behavior is disrespectful to fair property, judges, superintendents, extension educators, volunteers or other 4-H members; or whose behavior is not appropriate to standards and image of the New Hampshire 4-H program. 4-H members can be expelled from the fair for not complying with these expectations. Entering exhibits in 4-H authorizes the UNH Cooperative Extension 4-H to have and use any photographs taken of participants, projects, or animals as is necessary for reports and public relations.

OVERALL 4-H CLUB EXHIBIT AND EDUCATIONAL DISPLAYS

Clubs may enter both a club project display and a club educational display. In the project display members may enter projects in any listed (Division A-SP) class with the overall effect judged. If clubs enter both the educational display and the project display, clubs must register for two separate spaces. Educational exhibits should be planned and set up by a club committee and these displays may cover any theme desired, such as Health Checkup; Toddler Toys; Ready, Set, Sew; Get in Balance: Diet and Exercise; or Barn Safety Tips, etc.. Educational displays should be 3–4 feet wide. Remember to include on any educational exhibit a sign with club name and town for club exhibits and member name, age, and town for member exhibits. All exhibits should appropriately display a 4-H clover.

Bake the cake for 30 to 35 minutes, until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean, or with a few moist crumbs clinging to it. Once cool, frost cake with the simple chocolate icing.
