What is 4-H?

Sullivan County 4-H is a youth program through the University of New Hampshire Cooperative Extension. Sullivan County has approximately twenty 4-H clubs for boys and girls from "Cloverbud age" 5-7 and 4-H age 8-18. A 4-H club is a group of youth members with one or more adult volunteer leaders. Youth members develop life skills as they participate in monthly club meetings, community service projects, citizenship activities, club outings and individual projects. The projects completed throughout the year can be demonstrated and exhibited at various county and state contests including the Cornish Fair, which serves as the Sullivan County 4-H Fair.

The Cornish Fair is the annual 4-H Fair for Sullivan County. This 4-H Exhibitor's handbook provides 4-H exhibition rules, schedules and divisions of competition. The 4-H project divisions are categorized into classes. Carefully review the divisions and classes, as you will need this information when registering at the fair. Pay careful attention to all rules, requirements and deadlines. 4-H members age 8 and older may exhibit and compete at the Cornish Fair. Cloverbud members (ages 5-7) are not eligible to compete, but are invited to exhibit their projects. Enjoy the fair!

4-H EXHIBITS AND 4-H LIVESTOCK SHOWS GENERAL 4-H RULES

- Premiums listed are being offered to 4-H Clubs and 2015-2016 members in Sullivan County only unless otherwise noted. 1
- Juniors are members ages 8 13. Seniors are members ages 14 and older. 2
- 3 Products and articles exhibited must represent work done since September 2015, by the members or Cloverbuds. Work exhibited must have been done as a 4-H project. (Articles made in school or church school should be entered in the open show). Members must be enrolled in the 4-H project to exhibit in a specific area.
- Members may enter any class within their project division, unless otherwise stated. 4.
- All exhibits must reach the Fairgrounds between 2:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. Thursday, August 18, and be set up by representatives of local 5. clubs. Exhibits must remain in place until 6:00 p.m. Sunday or premiums will be forfeited.
- Products or articles not making a satisfactory exhibit or improperly labeled may be rejected or moved to appropriate class. 4-H exhibit tags 6. are available at the County Extension Office or from organizational leaders. 4-H member's age (as of January 1, 2016) must be indicated on tag.
- 7. Duplicate entries by an individual in any class will not be allowed, except in the Arts and Crafts Division, Heritage Arts Division and Photography.
- Exhibits are to be shown at the member's own risk. 8.
- Club exhibits must be registered with Robin Luther, 4-H Youth Development, 24 Main Street, Newport, NH 03773 two days prior to the Fair. 9 10. Premiums may be withheld from members not complying with any rule or regulation in any 4-H class or not reporting work done at the end of the 4-H year. Premiums will not be awarded to Cloverbud members. (They will receive participation ribbons.)
- 11. Judges will consider the difficulty of the project and the years of enrollment in the project, the age of exhibitor, specific project requirements and rules for exhibiting.
- 12. Best in Show Rosettes may be awarded at the judges' discretion and include a \$2.00 premium bonus.
- 13. In addition to the premiums listed, each exhibit receives a ribbon, based on the Danish System of judging: blue, red, or white.
- 13. Friday, August 19 is "4-H Day" and Sullivan County 4-H members can get into the Fair free if they wear a 4-H member exhibit tag obtainable from their 4-H club organizational leader.

4-H EXHIBITS: Cornish Elementary School

DIVISION I—ARTS AND CRAFTS

Decide the category (leather, knitting, etc.) where the craft belongs. Then decide the difficulty of the craft by reading each description of the three classes (simple, intermediate, and advanced). Write both the category and class on the exhibit tag! Only one article per category, per member is allowed, however, members may enter the class more than once. For example, members can enter only one item in Class 1, Category A – Y, but can also enter one item in Class 2, Category A – Y, and Class 3, Category A – Y. Do not use the Letter Categories more than once in each Class. Category Z in Division I and Category Y in Division II (may be used more than once in a Class, but no duplicate items will be awarded premiums.

All articles are judged according to age of member, guality of article, difficulty, skill, creativity, and time involved. Leaders should use their discretion in helping members place crafts in the proper classes and categories. Judges have the option of disgualifying crafts that do not show member's ability and talents appropriate to age level. All articles exhibited must have been done as a 4-H project. (School projects belong in the Open Show in the Cornish School avm.)

Class 1. Simple Crafts: Junior members only (ages 8-13). A craft that is completed in one hour or less involving very basic skills like: cutting, gluing or coloring

- Class 2. Intermediate Crafts: Require moderate skill, creativity, and time.
- Class 3. Advanced Crafts: This is the most advanced class, reserved for outstanding, ambitious, and complicated crafts. A 3"x5" card describing construction, time, cost and use MUST be attached to crafts. A rosette will be awarded to the 4-H member who earns the honor of "best of show" in the Advanced Arts & Crafts Division.
- Class 4. Cloverbud Members Only will be permitted to enter multiple crafts per category but they must be tagged as a group. One ribbon will be awarded per group. A special area will be designated for Cloverbud Crafts.

Any article, collection or exhibit as part of the Conservation Project may be entered. Each entry must be different. (Limit 2 different entries per division.) Entries may be exhibited in soil, water, wildlife as related to nature; bird study, marine or ocean awareness, rocks and minerals, weather, plants, etc. A collection of photographs of difficult to preserve or endangered specimens will be acceptable. DIVISION X—CLUB & INDIVIDUAL EXHIBITS

All group exhibits in the following classes will be arranged by clubs and **set up by the club representatives** (with leader supervision) Thursday afternoon or evening. Space allowed is 4' by the depth of a table (approximately 30") for a large exhibit. 4-H ANIMAL EXHIBITOR EXPECTATIONS AND RULES

Beef, Dairy, Goats, Horse, Sheep, Rabbits & Cavies, Working Steer

- A. 4-H Entry Deadline: August 1, all 4-H entries must be sent directly to Robin Luther, Youth & Family/ 4-H Youth Development, UNH Cooperative Extension, 24 Main Street, Newport, NH 03773. (Do not send 4-H entries to open or 4-H show superintendents.)
- B. Animals must be in place by 7:00 a.m. Friday and remain until 6:00 p.m. Sunday or released by a show superintendent.
- C. ELIGIBILITY: 4-H classes are open to currently enrolled 4-H animal project members who have pre-registered by the deadline date. Due to limited space the goat, horse, poultry, sheep and working steer shows are only open to specified N.H. counties. The University of New Hampshire Cooperative Extension is an equal opportunity educator and employer. University of New Hampshire, U.S. Department of Agriculture and N.H. counties cooperating.
- D. Exhibitor Age: All youth exhibitor ages are calculated as of January 1 of the current year. No youth under age 8 is permitted to exhibit a large animal in a 4-H livestock show.

Novice member: Age 8 or youth in their first year of showing and under 14 years of age.

Junior member:	youth ages 9 - 11
Intermediate:	youth ages 12 - 13
Senior:	youth ages 14 - 18

- NOTE: Junior and Intermediate age divisions may be combined depending on the number of exhibitor entries received.
- E. 4-H members are the sole responsibility of their parent or guardian during the entire duration of the fair.
- F. 4-H members and their parents or guardians shall conduct themselves appropriately, reflecting positively on the 4-H program.
- G. Youth shall represent 4-H and their project to the general public in a positive way, helping to inform them about 4-H and agriculture. Actions must reflect the highest standards of honor and integrity and the best practices relating to their animal project. No type of animal abuse shall be tolerated.
- H. 4-H members shall not use or possess alcoholic beverages, tobacco, or controlled substances.
- I. All judges and fair/show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect. No person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them. Direct criticism or interference with the judge or fair/show officials before, during or after the competitive event is prohibited.
- J. 4-H members are solely responsible for showing and handling their animal in the ring. The 4-H exhibitor must prepare their animal to be shown.
- K. Participating in Fit and Show is required. 4-H exhibitors must show their own project animal in the appropriate Fit and Show class. They must use an animal they will also exhibit in a type, performance or market class during the 4-H show.
- L. Appropriate Dress: It is expected 4-H youth will wear appropriate attire when they are exhibiting in a 4-H show. The 4-H attire of white collared shirt, solid colored white or Khaki pants (<u>No</u> blue jeans) unless otherwise specified. Exceptions: Working Steer-green pants; Beef-black pants; Equine attire-riding clothes appropriate to their seat (boots with heels required) as well as a properly fitted and approved helmet worn at all times when mounted. If skirt is worn instead of pants, it must be no shorter than 2 inches above the knee. Safe shoes or boots must be worn (laces must be tied). <u>NO flip-flops or open toed shoes</u> in the barn areas or show rings. Corporate/farm sponsorship is unacceptable at 4-H shows. 4-H Horse show participants will also follow rules in the NH supplement to the New England 4-H Horse Show Rules and Guidelines.
- M. 4-H project animals are shown at the risk of the 4-H owner or lessor. Any damages to person's or property are the legal and financial responsibility of the 4-H member and the family who owns and leases the animal. All large animal exhibitors (beef, dairy, horse) will be required to submit a certificate of liability insurance in the amount of \$300,000 in the name of the person listed on the entry form.
- M. All animals or groups of animals shown must be owned or leased by the 4-H member. Animals to be exhibited must be appropriately named on a current, valid 4-H project approval form and corresponding lease agreement.
- O. Age of animal Any animal that will be shown in a 4-H class must have been born by and listed on the 4-H approval form by the specified date for that species.
- P. Exhibitors are responsible for presenting the required credentials for their project animal(s). Original registration papers, approval forms and lease agreements must be presented at the proper time for their show.
- Q. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to know what class they are supposed to be in and when that class will take place. Exhibitors who miss their class will not be allowed to exhibit in a class designated for another group. Exhibitors who miss their showmanship class may exhibit in the rest of the show, but will receive no premiums. Exhibitors missing a breed or market class will not receive premiums in the class missed.
- R. Animal Health: all 4-H exhibitors must adhere to the health regulations for 2016 N.H. Fairs and shows and any additional requirements outlined in the open show section of this premium book. In addition to current health standards all animals exhibited must be immunized for rabies at least 30 days prior and within one year of the event.
- S. Animal Care: Exhibitors are responsible for the care and feeding of their animals. They are to be kept neat and presentable. Sawdust and water will be provided by the fair. Exhibitors must provide their own feed (hay/grain) and straw for bedding.
- T. Final Cleanup: Exhibitors are expected to clean out the area in which animals were housed. Premiums will be forfeited if not done. Breakfast for 4-H livestock exhibitors will be furnished by the fair on Friday, Saturday and Sunday mornings. You must have a special ticket, which will be distributed by show superintendents at check-in. Adult volunteers will be needed to help prepare and serve.
- U. Camping in designated areas only, on a first come, first serve basis. No electricity or water. No awnings. No charge.
- V. Laser pointers are prohibited from use.

DIVISION XXIV - RABBITS

- A. Refer to General Livestock Rules.
- B. Animals must be clean and healthy or will be barred from the show. They must be legibly and permanently ear marked. All animals will be inspected prior to penning. Each exhibitor is allowed up to four (4) entries, except doe and litter.
- C. Exhibitors are responsible for take-down of the cages they use, care of their animals and neatness of exhibit area all 3 days on the fairgrounds. Those members not complying will forfeit premiums.
- D. Records: Members must have their project records available for inspection by the judge. Record forms are available from the 4-H office.
- E. Cages: Standard rabbit cages will be provided on first come, first served basis. Members must provide animals' bedding; feed and water (please bring containers for feed and water).
- F. Animals for Sale: Members may have animals for sale ONLY IF they have made arrangements with the superintendent in advance. These animals must be healthy and meet health requirements including rabies vaccination.
