Cooperative Extension partnered with the Northern Forest Center to help Lancaster identify its economic assets, as well as identify strategies for growing and sustaining the local economy as part of its Master Plan.



Forestry and Wildlife staff advised 161 woodlot owners, resulting in improved management on 14,508 acres of forestland. Staff provided technical assistance to 13 communities in Coös County.



County Impact Examples

Vocational agriculture students participated in an agricultural decision making workshop. 14 farms received training in safe meat processing. The InfoLine answered 54 home and garden questions from county residents.

(603) 862-1520 Open: M-F, 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. In Coös County, 81 volunteers gave 9,681 volunteer hours to 4-H and other programs equaling 5 full-time employees. 96% of Youth Mental Health First Aid participants reported increased confidence in their ability to address youth mental health issues and two schools improved their health and wellness policies affecting 367 students.


Technical assistance and planning support was provided to **31** New Hampshire towns.

UNH PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT & TRAINING (PD & T)
