Habitat Management

"A highlight of my efforts as a Coverts Cooperator this year was finding an expanding stand of Japanese knotweed on a neighbor's property, talking with them about how to defeat its spread, and then see the neighbor actually tackle it. It had the potential for major spread in the neighborhood and he took it seriously and it is almost eradicated. This is a neighbor who never thought about invasive plants and yet was open to learn, and now is a big advocate and learning about invasive plants himself."

VOLUNTEER SERVICE

In 2020, Coverts Cooperators contributed **24,097 volunteer hours** on behalf of forest stewardship or wildlife habitat issues in their communities, valued at over **\$632,000**. Coverts Cooperators **worked to conserve over 5,226 acres** of land in their communities, and **reached out to over 11,876 people** with a message of sound forest stewardship and wildlife conservation in 2020.

SPEAKING FOR WILDLIFE

The *Speaking for Wildlife* program involves over 200 Coverts Cooperators and other trained volunteers in conducting wildlifethemed presentations and leading field walks on conservation lands statewide. 2020 impacts from this group of volunteers include:

- Volunteers delivered 6 public talks reaching 154 people
- Volunteers led 4 field walks, with over 49 participants

Since the development of the program in 2010, *Speaking for Wildlife* volunteers have delivered over **350 presentations** and **150 field walks** reaching over **9,500 people** throughout New Hampshire.

LAND MANAGEMENT

Coverts volunteers currently own or manage **over 143,000 acres** in New Hampshire and manage thousands of acres for wildlife each year.



CUMULATIVE IMPACTS 1999-2020

Since 1999 (the first year data is available), Coverts volunteers have contributed over **380,600 hours** of service on behalf of wildlife and stewardship to the state of New Hampshire. This has an estimated value of over **\$7.8 million.** Coverts Cooperators have reached over **509,000 people** through outreach efforts, and worked to permanently conserve **330,000 acres** of land.

ADAPTING in 2020

- Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, NH Coverts Project staff (in partnership with UNH Extension & NH Fish and Game leadership) made the decision to cancel this year's annual training workshop.
- In lieu of holding the annual workshop, Coverts Project staff focused on the development of online programming to provide continuing education for existing NH Coverts Project volunteers and others interested in wildlife, habitat management, and forest stewardship, including:
 - Learn Your Land: Inventorying & Monitoring Wildlife on Your Property August 11, 2020; 68 participants
 - Using Trail Cameras to Study Wildlife September 9, 2020;164 attendees
 - NH Woods & Wildlife: Live! Nature & Ecology of NH's Wildlife May 14, 2020; 1,700 views
 - NH Woods & Wildlife: Live! Stewardship & Management of NH's Habitats May 21, 2020; 399 views
- Sent 13 e-mail newsletter updates that included volunteer opportunities, workshops and trainings, and news items posted to the NH Coverts Project website and blog.
- Promoted Coverts participation in hundreds of trainings and volunteer opportunities statewide, including through *Nature Groupie*.
- Continued the *Speaking for Wildlife* volunteer speakers bureau program, training 11 new volunteers many who are also Coverts Cooperators. An additional training was held for existing volunteers interested in presenting online.

LOOKING AHEAD to 2021



- Train up to 25 new volunteers at the 2021
 Coverts Workshop, currently scheduled for
 May 5-8 in Greenfield, NH. However, due to the
 ongoing Covid-19 pandemic, the Coverts
 Project staff is currently in the initial stages of
 discussing and planning for a hybrid model
 involving both online and in-person outdoor
 learning.
- Continue to improve volunteer and continuing education opportunities for Coverts volunteers, including through *Nature Groupie*.
- Plan and implement continuing education opportunities specifically for NH Coverts Project volunteers. Special attention will be given to development of online trainings and small, in-person gatherings (as possible).
